Redlands on Moreton Bay – more to explore and experience

Redlands on Moreton Bay, with its combination of mainland, coastline and island locations, is south-east Queensland's best kept destination secret.

There's a great range of water-based sports and activities on offer, including kayaking, windsurfing, fishing, snorkeling, scuba diving and surfing, along with safe swimming beaches.

Those looking for a more relaxed break can visit one of the luxurious day spas, wander through Redlands' numerous art galleries or weekend markets, or enjoy quality local wines, seafood and produce in one of the award winning restaurants and popular dining precincts.

It's also easy to get back to nature in the Redlands. With Moreton Bay and the Pacific Ocean on its doorstep and around 4,000 hectares of bushland, the area is a haven for marine life and fauna and a wide variety of native vegetation.

You can get up close and personal with a range of creatures, from dolphins, turtles and manta rays to wallabies and koalas, reptiles, frogs, birds and butterflies. Between June and November, you can also spot migrating whales from Point Lookout and eastern beaches on North Stradbroke Island.

The Redlands is an area rich in local history, with informative heritage trails around Cleveland and Ormiston, Southern Moreton Bay Islands and North Stradbroke Island (the latter is home to the Dunwich Museum and historic Dunwich Cemetery, and has a highly respected Indigenous history).

Throughout the year, the Redlands comes alive in celebration. Festivals and major events are regularly staged across the mainland and islands, with signature celebrations including Redlands Spring Festival, Island Time Festival, Indigi Day Out, the Stradbroke Chamber Music Festival and Redland Bluegrass Convention at Redland Bay, the Straddie Salute off-road triathlon and the Straddie Assault Surfing Competition.
